HOW TO ENCOURAGE PASTORS:

A Biblical Guide to Ministering to Ministers

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Introduction

- Paul, in 2 Timothy 1:15-18, experienced desertion by many fellow believers during his imprisonment, except for Onesiphorus, who sought him out and "refreshed" him—physically, emotionally, and spiritually.
- Pastors today face similar hardships: stress, conflict, family pressures, feelings of inadequacy, and isolation (Fuller Institute & Barna Research).
- Congregations are called to minister to pastors, supporting them as Onesiphorus did Paul.
- Our focus is on all our pastors and elders.

A Biblical Guide to Ministering to Ministers

1. Choose to Respect Your Pastor

- Scripture: 1 Thessalonians 5:12
- Respect is not earned only by performance but includes:
 - o **Earned respect:** Admiration for moral and spiritual character (1 Timothy 3:2).
 - o **Inherent respect:** Every human is made in God's image.
 - o **Positional respect:** Respect God-appointed leaders (1 Peter 2:18).
- Choose to honor and submit to leaders, even when styles or opinions differ.

2. Bless Your Pastor with Unconditional Love

- Scripture: 1 Thessalonians 5:12-13
- Love pastors not only for their virtues but with preemptive, God-empowered love.
- Action-oriented love includes: encouraging, supporting, and caring for pastors and their families.
- Like Onesiphorus, believers should refresh and uplift their pastors.

3. Follow Your Pastor's Leadership in Submissive Obedience

- **Scripture:** Hebrews 13:7,17; 2 Timothy 2:24-26
- Pastors are overseers (bishops) responsible for guiding the flock (1 Peter 5:1-4).
- Congregations should submit to pastoral leadership, while pastors avoid authoritarianism and practice servant leadership (Luke 22:26).

4. Make Your Pastor's Work a Joy, Not a Burden

- **Scripture:** Hebrews 13:17
- Reflect on whether your actions encourage or discourage your pastor.
- Questions for self-assessment: Are you a cheerleader or a party pooper? Do you serve or demand service?

5. Lift Your Pastor Up in Prayer

• Scripture: Hebrews 13:18-19; Colossians 4:2-4

- Prayers should be sincere and thankful, covering spiritual growth, boldness, holiness, wisdom, health, and family.
- Avoid using prayer as a means to vent complaints.

6. Generously Meet Your Pastor's Needs

- **Scripture:** 1 Timothy 5:17-18; Philippians 4:10-19
- Avoid stinginess or unfair comparisons. Offer adequate salary, vacation, and support.
- Generosity demonstrates love, respect, and worship to God.

7. Don't Play the Comparison Game

- Scripture: 1 Corinthians 3:3-5, 4:6
- Avoid comparing your pastor to media figures or predecessors.
- Each pastor is uniquely gifted and should be appreciated in their God-given style.

8. Appreciate Your Pastor's God-Given Uniqueness

- Scripture: 2 Corinthians 10:10-13;1 Corinthians 12:4-6,11
- God equips each pastor with unique gifts and a "ministry niche."
- Congregations should allow pastors to use their spiritual resources creatively.

9. Don't Let Pastors Do Your Ministry

- Scripture: Ephesians 4:11-12,16
- Every believer is called to serve (Ephesians 2:10).
- Pastors equip and empower members but should not replace them in ministry.

10. Handle Your Differences Biblically

• **Scripture:** Matthew 18:15-17; 1 Timothy 5:19-20

Here is a biblical approach to resolving conflicts with leaders:

- 1. Search your heart: Remove sin, selfishness, and bias. Ensure the issue is objective, not personal.
- 2. Go privately to the leader (Matthew 18:15). Avoid public ambushes.
- 3. Be gentle in confrontation (Galatians 6:1). Care for the person more than the issue.
- 4. Be specific: General complaints are unclear and unhelpful.
- 5. Give suggestions for improvement: Help rather than blame.
- 6. Focus on actions, not motives (1 Corinthians 4:3-5). Only God knows the heart.
- 7. Bring a companion if needed (Matthew 18:16). They provide clarity and witness.
- 8. Escalate appropriately if the leader refuses repentance (Matthew 18:17).

Conclusion

- **Scripture:** 1 Timothy 3:1
- Pastoral ministry is noble but demanding. Congregational support directly affects pastoral effectiveness.
- God will hold each believer accountable for how they ministered to their ministers.

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
